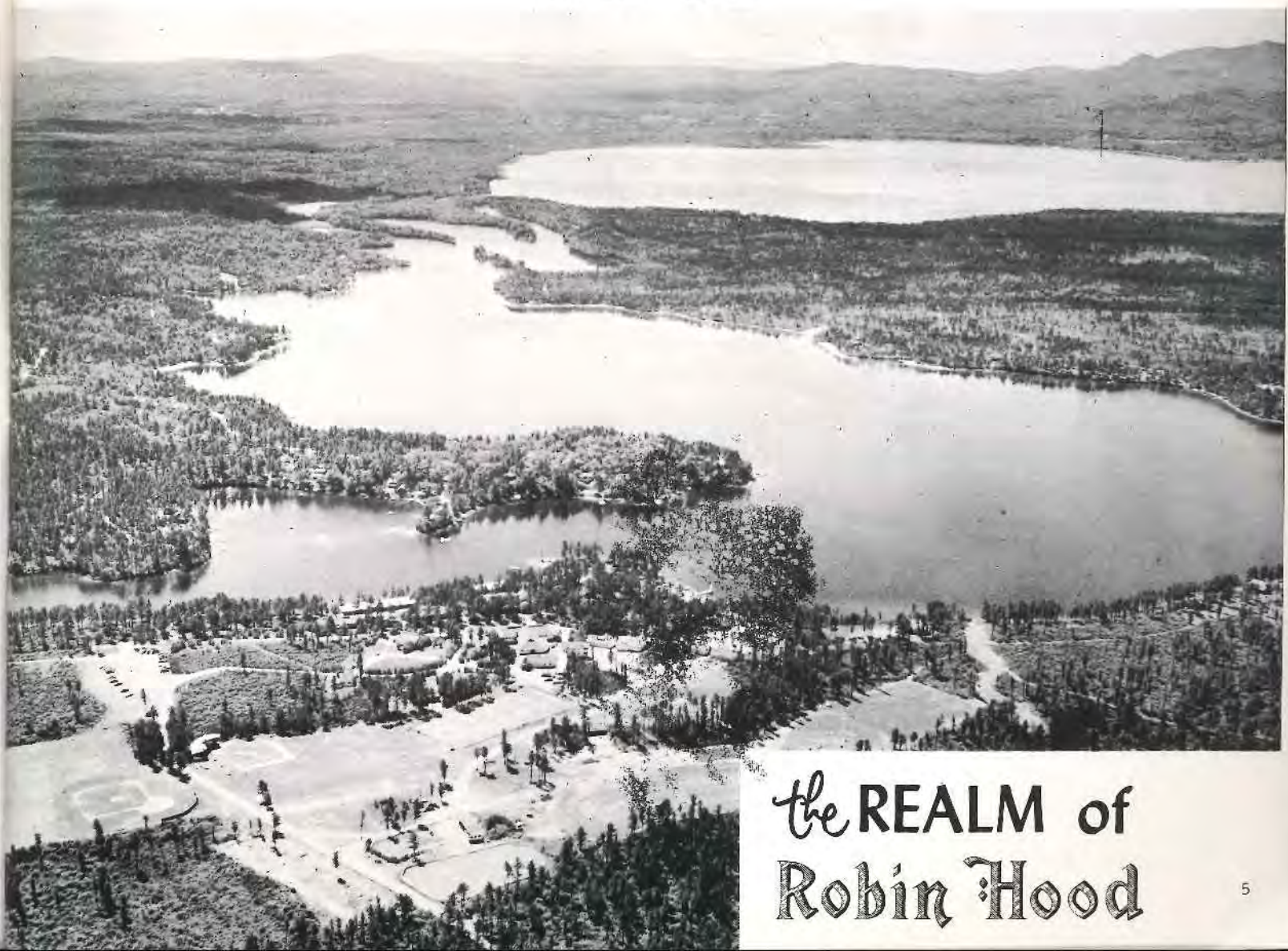

Halfway through the summer, the Archers started scuba diving with Bobby Brown, Kenny Kamhi, Stu Singer, Dave Solomon and Matt Wolf all having a great time saying hello to the fish and examining the sunken sailfish. The Archers went on a trip into Lake Ossipee, diving from the raft into previously uncharted depths.

Whenever the Yeomen were scheduled you could always count on a good turnout with Ed Fallon, Jeremy Flug and Bob Bostwick always being the first to arrive to fit themselves out. Glenn Schattman and Tom Dwork dove for the first time this year, and spent many happy scuba hours feeding the ever hungry fish of the crib. The increase in the volume of water during the Flood of '73 paralleled a big gain in the interests and achievements of our swimming program.

Water safety, self-confidence and enjoyment in the water were major goals, with individual instruction at the camper's level of ability. Classes were held in form and speed swimming. Red Cross courses were given which also included junior and senior life saving. Sixteen lap (400 yds.) tests were the first order of business. Then came the island swim (3/4 of a mile). Campers were grouped according to their swimming skills and everyone had time trials in the major strokes.

Trophies went to the following for their outstanding progress and dedication to their swimming skills: Archer Geoffrey Werbin for Greatest Progress in Camp. His dedication and long hours were very evident at the end of the season. Archers Stuart Singer and David Landrum once again were the recipients of the Outstanding Swimming Award on junior camp. Friar Andy Brown continued to be number one, and was again voted the Senior Camp's Best Swimmer.

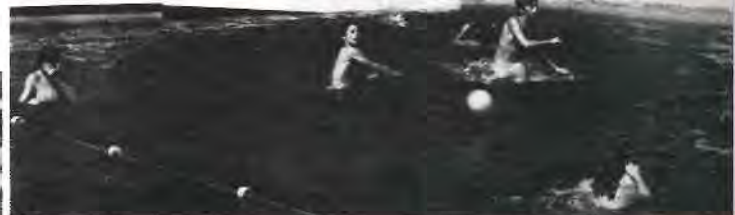

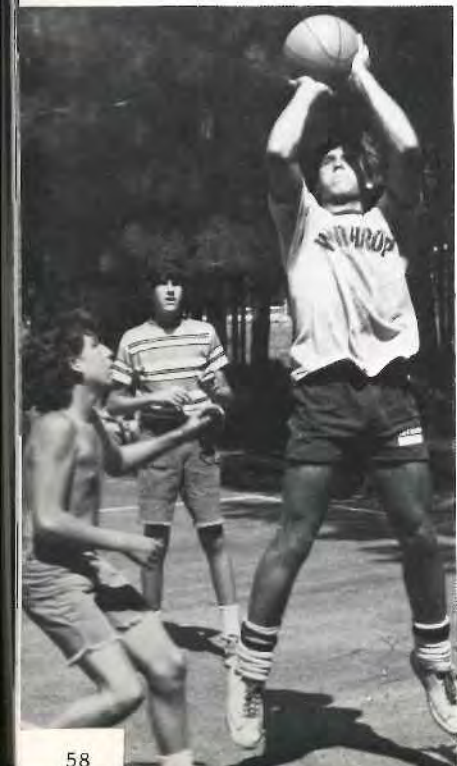
Rob Colburn, Chris Flory and Bob Sonnenblick were the skiing talent of the Foresters.

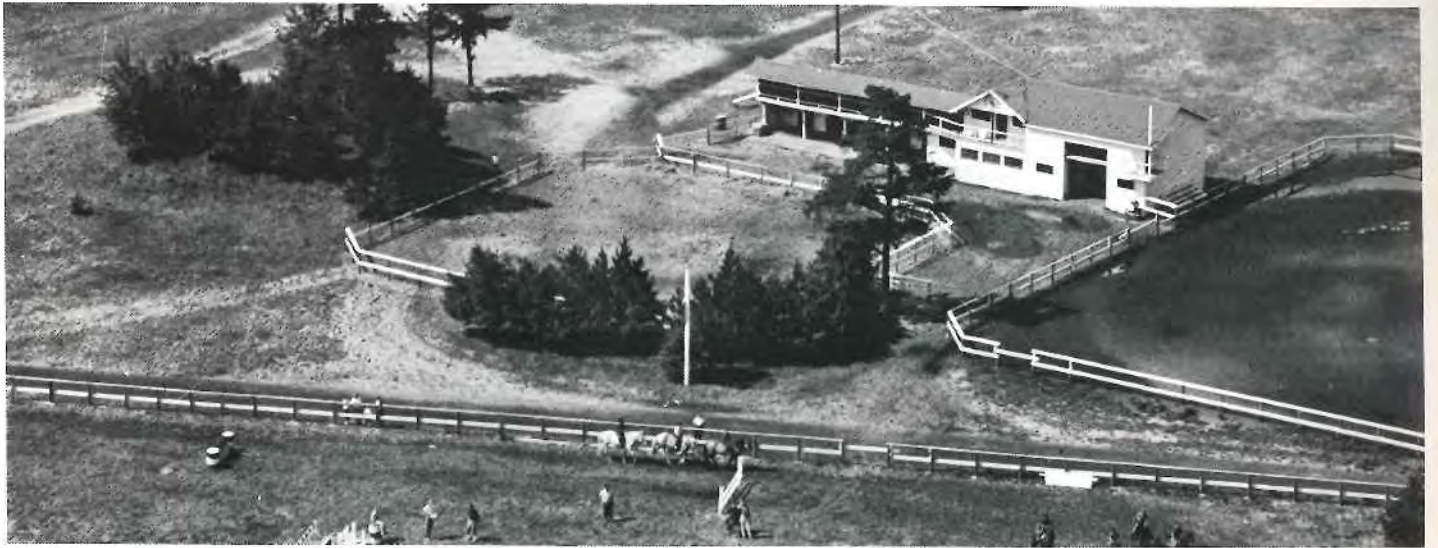
