8. STAUNCH MEN OF ROBIN HOOD

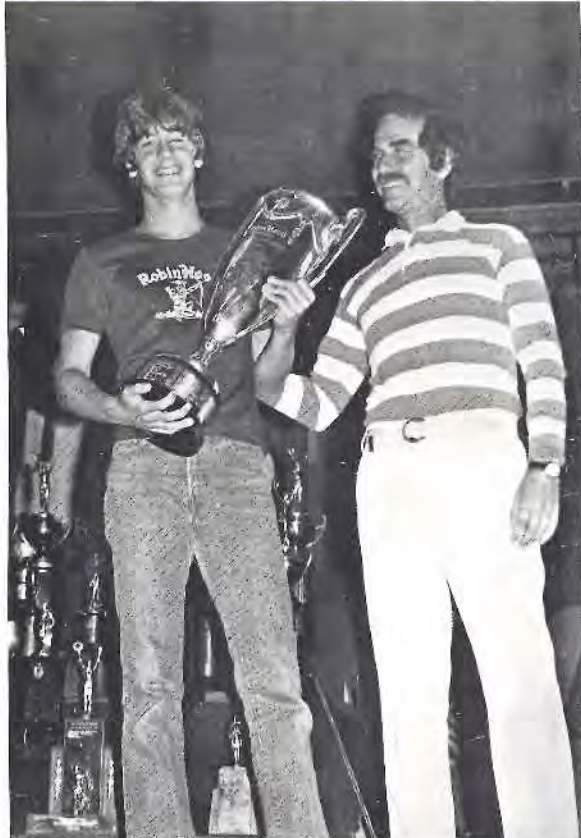
Staunch men of ROBIN HOOD,
