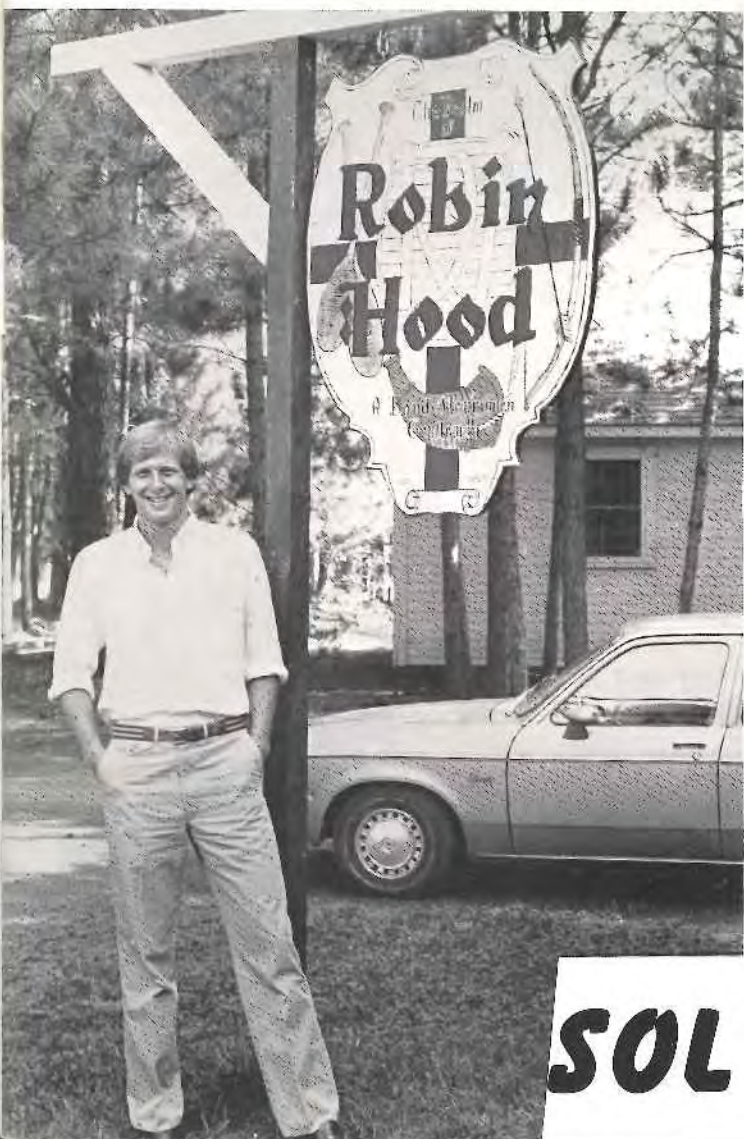

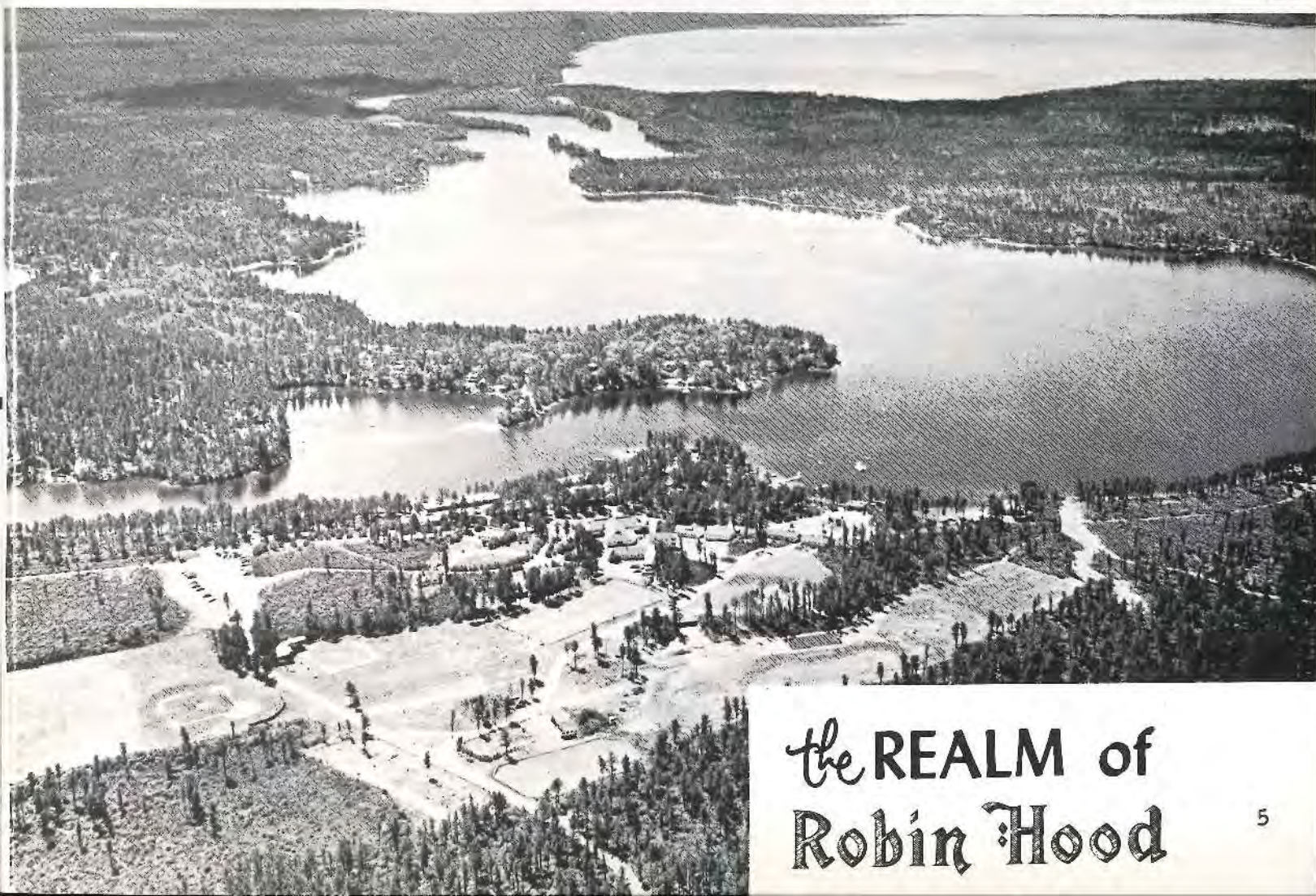

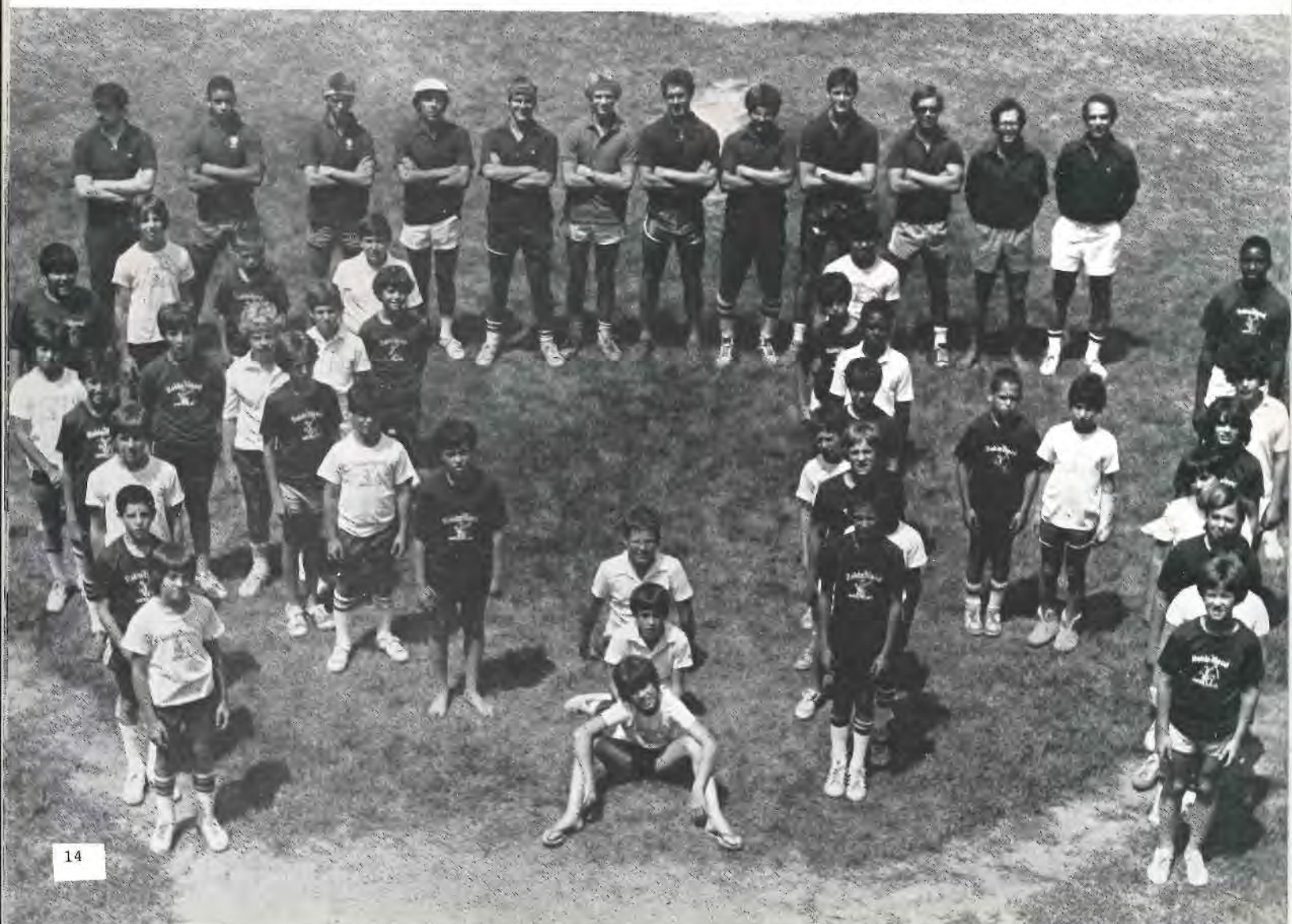

1983 has been a rewarding summer for the Arts and Crafts department. There has been much outstanding work done this summer. Many of the projects were done in the shop using the machines and tools. A popular activity has been copper enameling as well as woodworking, string art, casting, etching.

The TPJs and the Squires enjoyed the making of name plaques and name tags from leather. Josh Gottheimer made several leather name tags for his family. For the Squires, Joey Saroken worked the longest and the hardest on a name plaque for his room at home. Some of the other projects by the Squires were string art and wooden stools. The stools were cut out by a hand saw and then nailed together. The finishing touch was a wood stain which enhanced the stool. Also there were many fine games produced by both groups.

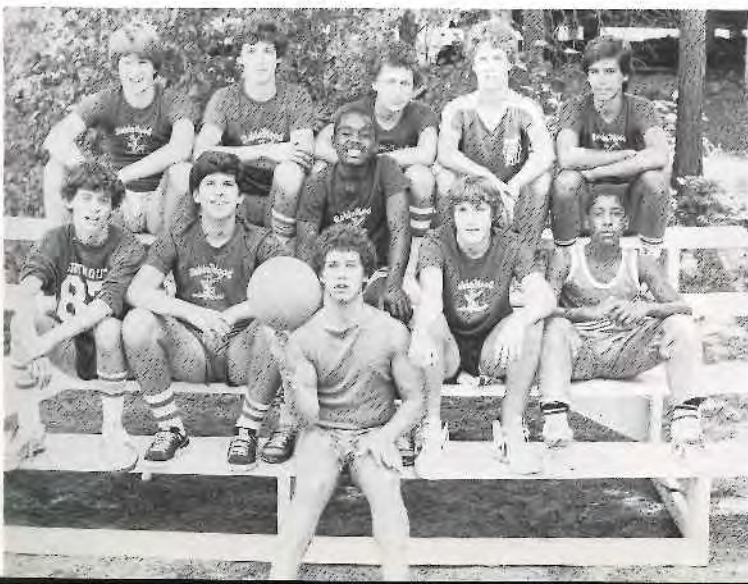
BASEBALL

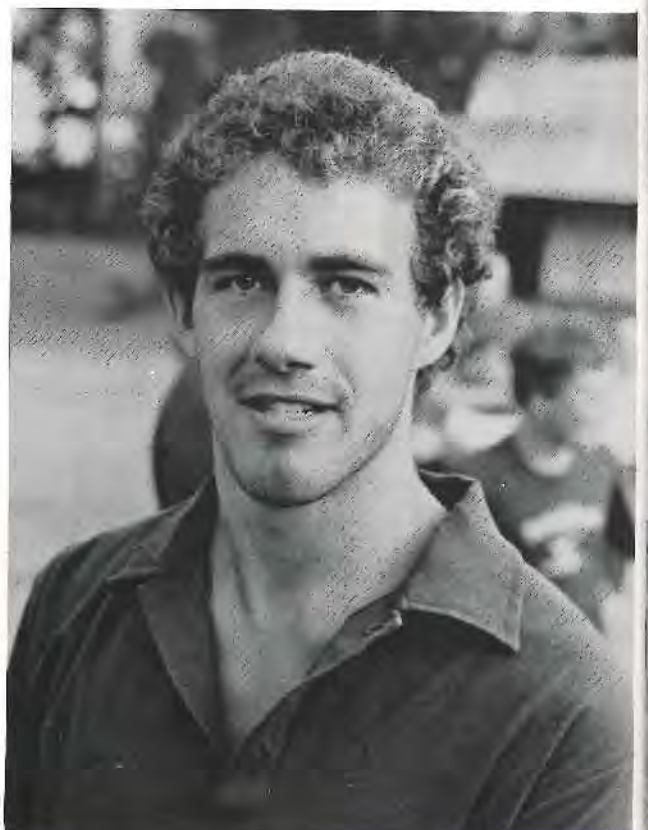

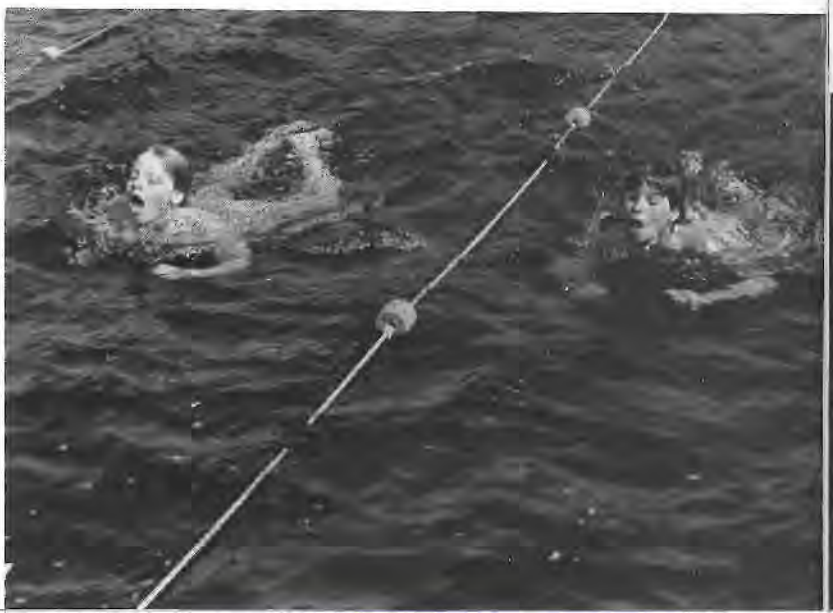
SWIMMING

RON WEST

The Robin Hood swimming program was very successful this summer. There were many campers who arrived as non-swimmers and left knowing that they had grown in confidence and capability. Other campers refined their strokes and learned new ones. To get to that point, we had to start at square one.

The first order of business was the 16-lap swim test and stroke analysis. That was done to ensure the campers' safety and to place them in Red Cross swim classes. The campers were then timed in freestyle, breaststroke and backstroke. The times were used to help select entries for the swim meets in which the camp participated. Once the testing was completed, the instruction began.

There was a great deal of time devoted to Red Cross instruction. The TPJs worked on Beginners, Advanced Beginners and Intermediates. The basics were taught in Beginners. The campers worked on crawl stroke, rhythmic breathing, and flutter kick on front and back. Diving was also practiced. The Advanced Beginners improved their crawl stroke form and learned elementary backstroke. The Intermediate swimmers improved their coordination of crawl and elementary backstroke, while learning sidestroke and breaststroke. The Squires also took these classes, while some took the Swimmers course. In this course, the campers worked on improving their form in crawl, elementary back, sidestroke, and breaststroke. They swam for distance in order to improve the strength and consistency of their strokes. The Archers worked on the same classes. Some, who had already passed Swimmers, participated in a strokes clinic. The clinic was designed to improve form and build endurance in all strokes. They usually swam a half mile each class. The Yeomen and Lancers worked on Basic Rescue and Water Safety. They learned how to adapt their strokes for approaching and towing passive victims. Personal safety on and around the water was stressed, along with elementary forms of rescue. The highest course offered was Advanced Lifesaving. This was given on a voluntary basis to the Foresters and Saxons. The course qualifies a person to apply for a job as a lifeguard.
