### 8. STAUNCH MEN OF ROBIN HOOD

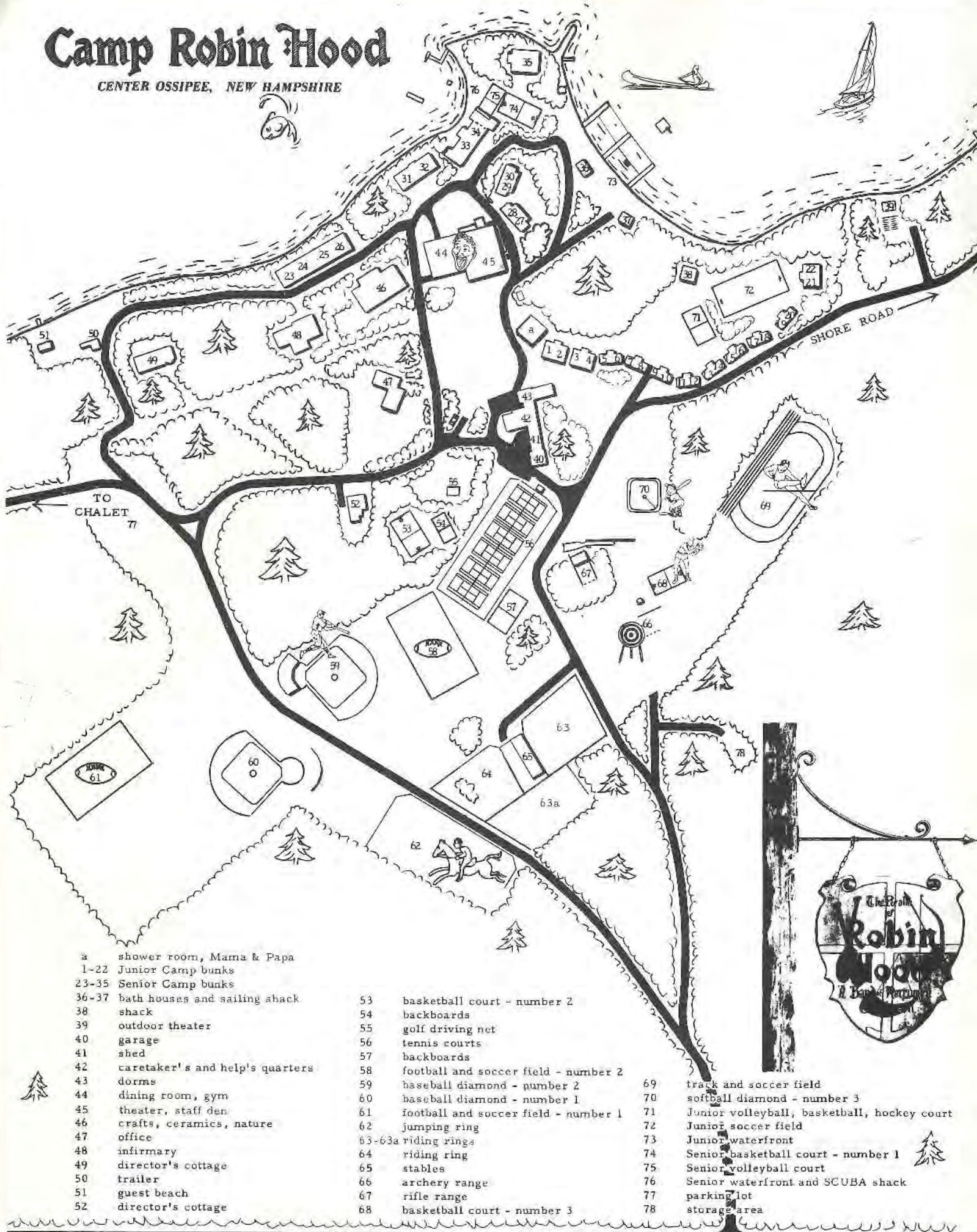
Staunch men of ROBIN HOOD,

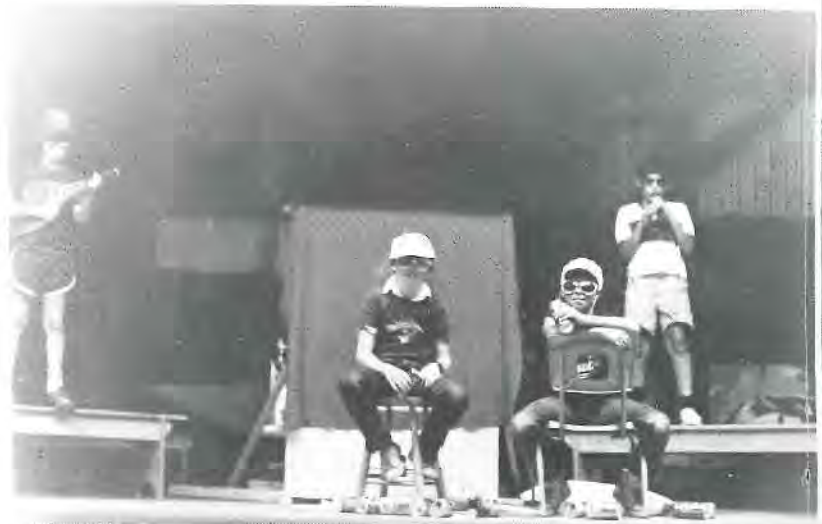
# DRAMATICS

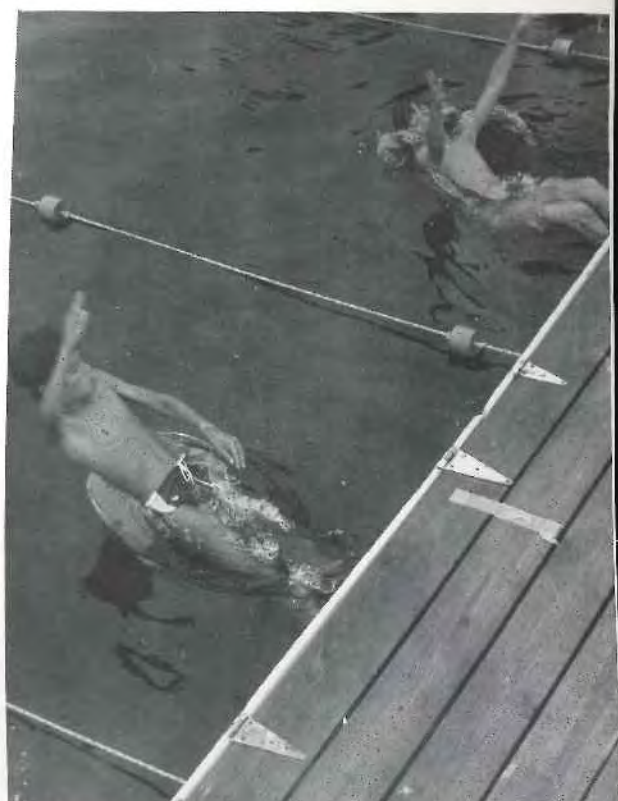

# INTER-CAMP ATHLETICS

# BASKETBALL TOURNEY CHAMPS

The 1984 intercamp athletic schedule was one of the most successful in Robin Hood's history. Overall, the men in green won nearly seventy percent of all intercamp competition. Particularly strong this season were the 13 and under basketball team, which finished with a 12-1 record on their way to two tournament championships, and all of the RH swim teams, which often placed first in various age groups while placing first overall in one of the summer's largest swim meets. Let's take a look at some of those moments that made the Robin Hood intercamp season such a success.

## BASKETBALL 16 AND UNDER

The 16 and under basketball team started off its season with an impressive win over the always tough Camp Winaukee team. Robin Hood was led by point guard John Morgan and center Andy Sobel. Winaukee could not control Johnny's speed and ball skills nor Andy's rebounding and follow-up abilities. The remainder of the starting team was Dan Tower at guard with Dougie Kahn and Paco Torano at the forward positions. We also had a strong bench with Greg Lippard as guard-forward and Jeff Solomon as center-forward. And thus began the fate of the 1984 Camp Robin Hood "Jews and Two" 16 and under basketball team.

The next night, we ventured to West End House, where we met up with a strong and well-drilled team. The first half our defense was not present on the court, as we decided to spot West End a 30 point lead. The second half was a different story as Robin Hood came out storming. We lost the game by 7 points, but we put on a clinic in our attempted comeback. Everyone contributed to the revitalization but were led by Dan Tower and John Morgan from the outside, each scoring in double figures. On the boards, Paco Torano led the way, making it seem as if he were 7 inches taller than everyone else.

General Manager Dave Solomon then decided to give the guys a week off, as he and Coach Mark Weiner had to settle contract negotiations with the 15 and under team. This team was basically the same team but with additions Don Conley, Seth Evans, Tom Heymsfeld, Jason Leventon and Craig Shensa. These players fit in well with Tower, Morgan and J. Solomon to form a quick and explosive team. They adopted our plays well, as they were already performing admirably on the 13 and under team, our minor league affiliate. Both games the 15 and under played were against Camp Alton, a much larger and stronger team. They prevailed over us in the first game by 9 points, as Robin Hood was led by Don Conley in scoring and rebounding, and by 1 point in the second. Their continuity, the fact that they had been playing together all season, enabled them to prevail.

Next, another game against West End was lost; this was just a warm-up for the ANNUAL ROBIN HOOD DOUBLE ELIMINATION TOURNAMENT. In the first game, Robin Hood faced Camp Winaukee. Despite playing a strong and sound game, Robin Hood fell apart in the last minute to suffer a 1 point defeat. RH was led by Andy Sobel and Doug Kahn in rebounding and scoring respectively. In the second game, RH had the unfortunate luck of facing West End. The final score was lost by the statistician in a large wind gust off of Broad Bay which blew the scorebook all the way to California (I think it was untraceable!)

The grand finale of the Robin Hood 16 and under team occurred at the West End Tournament in which RH suffered a last-second defeat to Samoset, then losing to West End in the gym. Outside, when we played

Samoset, everyone contributed in the game, including reserve stars from the 13 and under Seth Evans, Tom Heymsfeld, and Jason Leventon. Doug Kahn was also hot from the outside. Inside the gym was a different story. No one could buy a basket and we got killed on the boards as we did not have Paco Torano due to a problem with his contract (there was a mountain trip).

## 13 AND UNDER

What can you say about a team of fourteen individuals from around the world who came to the Realm and formed a bond that will be a driving force for years. With hard work and determination, the 13 and under team molded to form one of the most winning teams in Robin Hood's 57 year history. Fast breaking to a 12-1 record, the team will certainly be remembered in years to come.

After two practices, the team opened up against a tough West End House team, a club that had consistently given Robin Hood trouble in the past. The starting team consisted of BIG Don Conley in the middle, steady Seth Evans at one forward, Jason Leventon at shooting guard, Craig Shensa at off guard, and the team leader, Danny Tower, at point guard. Richie Birns, the all-important sixth man, also saw a lot of playing time throughout the season. Behind Tower's sizzling 18 points, Don's 9 rebounds and Lev's 12 points, the men in green won easily by 12.

The next stop on the schedule was the West End Tournament with Camp Samoset, O-AT-KA and host West End House. After drawing Samoset in the first round, Robin Hood led 21-12 at the half. RH's pressing zone proved to be too much for the overpowered Samoset squad, and we extended our lead early in the second half. Seth Evans played a solid game, collecting 8 rebounds while scoring 10 points. Tower also played well, pumping in 17 points from the floor. Lev added 8, and Shensa played his usual "hustle all over the court" game. David Joseph was strong defensively, coming off the bench in the second half.

After knocking off favored Samoset, RH drew host West End. Down by 6 in the third period, the team pulled together to outscore West End 20-8 in the second half and to win the game by 5. Don had 19 points and owned the boards. Lev dumped in 12, and Tower hit 5 free throws in the fourth quarter to seal the game. Richie Birns was sensational defensively off the bench.



In the first game of the finals of the double elimination tourney, we lost to West End in a gym packed with their fans. After relaxing and eating dinner, we were ready for the deciding game. The team was further psyched up for the big game when a bus, two vans and two cars filled with spectators pulled into view. With the Robin Hood fans screaming and yelling, the team started into the gym for warm-up. West End came out strong to build a seven point lead by half time. However, in the third quarter, the momentum began to swing. Richie Birns came in off the bench to pressure West End's point guard. Lev got hot, and the men in green pulled to within 1 early in the fourth quarter. At this point, Robin Hood took control of the game, dominating both boards. With the score tied and less than four minutes remaining, Birns shifted into gear to roll off the last seven points of the game. Bedlam broke loose as Robin Hood won its first tournament in a while. With the help of Tommy, Eric, Toon, Castle, Winks, Williams and the rest of the supporting cast, it was truly a team win.

The next two games were against Alton and Birchmont. Behind Evans's 14 points and Tommy Heymsfeld's super playing off the bench, the team downed Alton by 11. In the Birchmont game, Tower scored nine as Robin Hood rolled to its sixth victory in seven games.

The Robin Hood Tournament was next, and once again, RH drew Samoset in the first round. Don was in foul trouble early, but Tower kept the team together and under control. Lev scored 8, but the big story was Tommy Heymsfeld coming off the bench to score 15 big points. The final score: RH 56 Samoset 25.

In the final, the team met arch rival Winaukee. Tower, Conley and Evans took over to build an 8 point half time lead. However, by midway into the fourth quarter, Winaukee had evened the score. Evans hit a follow-up to put RH up by 2. With 24 seconds left, Robin Hood was clutching a 1 point lead, and Winaukee had the ball. RH turned on the big D. With 20 seconds left, Evans cleared a rebound out to Lev, who carried the ball down court and was fouled. He went to the line, sank both free throws, icing the game and securing another tournament win for Robin Hood.

These were just the highlights of an outstanding season. What is not seen in these accounts is the way these young men molded together to play as a team. Leaving to join the 15 and under squad next summer will be Tower, Evans, Lev and Heymsfeld. Returning to the 13 and under will be Shensa, Don, Richie, Castle, Hersh, Lipps, Dopps, Toon, D.J. and Levy. Also moving up to the the 15 and under will be a strong group of Lancers: Winks, Williams and Cyrus.

At this point, I would like to thank each one of you guys for letting me coach and grow with you. It was a great season, and we had fun in both victory and defeat. You all showed tremendous character and poise and should be proud of everything we accomplished.

The 1984 Nature program was a fun-filled learning experience for the campers and myself. This year, Nature was limited to junior campers because of their enthusiasm. There was never a period when campers didn't come down in droves.

We started the year by taking each group out of camp to Shawtown Pond. Shawtown is a small pond of about 10 acres that is still undeveloped. While there, the kids were introduced to the Eastern Bullfrog, and the frogs were introduced and transplanted to the Realm's reptile and amphibian cage. While at the pond, we also found salamanders, tadpoles, leaches, birds, and an assortment of insects. We also walked up the stream which feeds the pond and found baby brook trout which were hatched during the past winter.

On the way out we saw a pretty black and red scarlet tanager, which is not common here in the summer. 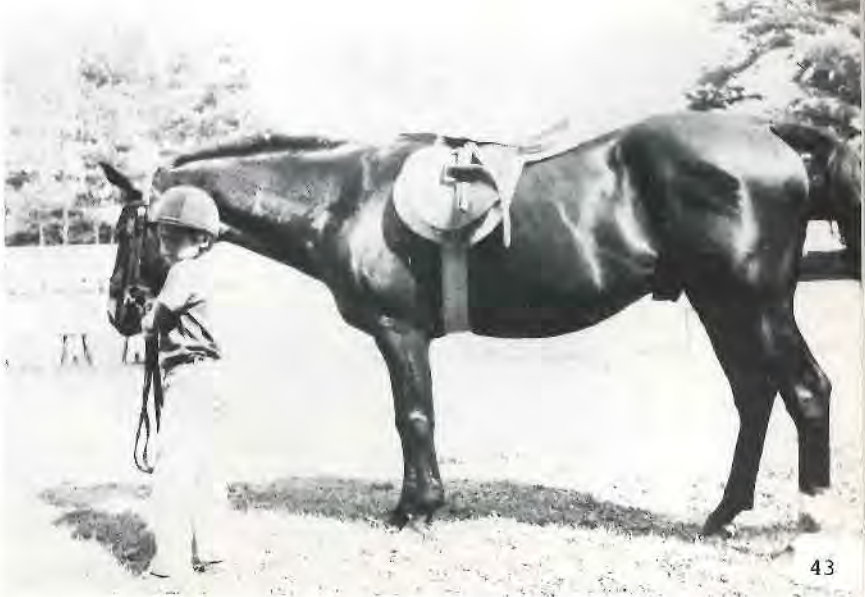

The summer of 1984 proved to be another outstanding season for riflery at Robin Hood. By the end of camp, some 30,000 rounds had been fired and over 120 shooters had come down to the range to shoot. A strong group of returning shooters combined with an eager group of beginners to give us another safe and successful year. By season's end, over a thousand targets had been submitted for scoring and 37 campers had earned their shooting medals.

The Jugglers came to riflery several times and did some excellent shooting. Josh Gottheimer was the first in his group to qualify for awards by shooting a 26 on the official NRA targets. Benjie Brockmann, Brian Saroken, Jimmy Castle and Mitch Hoffman also showed some remarkable effort, and we look forward to seeing them again next year.

The Squires were very strong in riflery with Seth Platt, Dan Rosen and Brian Ratner all progressing to the Sharpshooter level. This is a difficult award for anyone in Junior Camp to earn, and it has been several years since someone in the Squires has done this well. Dan Rosen's progress was so outstanding that he earned the award for Effort and Achievement this season. Josh Pimentel, Craig Goodfriend and Mitch Hughes also came to riflery many times this summer and showed much promise for the future.

# SWIMMING

RON WEST

June 27...the docks were in, the turn boards were on, the towers were up and we were ready to go. The waterfront opened for its 57th summer.

The first few days were devoted to testing all the campers. This was done to ensure the campers' safety and to place them in Red Cross swim classes. The campers were then timed in freestyle, breaststroke and backstroke. The times were used to help select entries for swim meets. After all the testing, we were ready to begin instruction.

There was a great deal of Red Cross instruction given to the junior campers. The TPJs worked on Beginners, Advanced Beginners, and Intermediates. In the Beginners' course, the campers are taught the basics: kicking on front and back, rhythmic breathing, and crawl stroke. They also got their first taste of diving. In Advanced Beginners, the campers improve on their coordination of the crawl stroke while learning elementary backstroke. The Intermediate swimmers improved on what was learned previously, and were taught sidestroke and breaststroke. Many of the Squires took these classes, while some were taught the Swimmers course. In this course, the campers improved their technique in sidestroke and breaststroke, while learning backstroke. The Archers worked on the same classes. Some, who had already passed Swimmers, participated in a strokes clinic. The clinic was designed to improve technique and build endurance in all strokes. The Yeomen took the Basic Rescue and Water Safety course. They learned how to adapt their strokes for approaching and towing passive victims. Personal safety on and around the water was stressed, along with elementary forms of rescue. Many of the Lancers worked on Advanced Swimmers. This is the highest swimming course the Red Cross offers. The campers worked on improving their endurance, and learned the overarm sidestroke, the trudgen, and the inverted breaststroke. The Foresters and Saxons were offered Advanced Lifesaving. The course qualifies a person to apply for a job as a lifeguard.

# TENNIS

# CARL WINSLOW



The tennis program this summer at Robin Hood was our adaptation of the Harry Hopman (former Australian Davis Cup coach) training methods. The program is based on intensive drilling situations which are geared towards three primary areas of concentration. One set of drills is designed to develop stroke production and is accompanied by large amounts of technical instruction. A second set of drills is designed to help a player improve his movement and balance. The third set of drills is organized to help the player improve his control and consistency. These drills were supplemented with match play to round out the players' games.

Although the organization of drills may sound somewhat complex, major effort was made to keep the instruction simple. The major ideals stressed in stroke production were early preparation and a smooth, relaxed, level stroke with a long follow-through. Once these things were mastered, ideas concerning weight transfer and production of spin were introduced. Our goal was to develop clean, simply-balanced, well-timed strokes.

The TPJs developed a strong stroking foundation by practicing "Shadow Strokes" without the ball. Once the strokes became consistent, they were allowed to practice with tennis balls in contrived situations. By the end of the summer, the TPJs developed enough to play in less controlled games such as "9 Lives".

The Squires suffered through a relearning and simplification of their strokes before being introduced to elemental drills. The group was very strong in tennis, and the competition amongst themselves helped accentuate their progress. By the end of the summer some Squires progressed enough to play doubles with members of the Friar group.

The Archers had reasonably sound strokes and needed to concentrate on ball judgement and body awareness. They learned how to move so that the ball was in the right place in relation to their bodies when the stroke was attempted. They also were introduced to the ideal of shifting their body weight into their shots. In the beginning, the weight came before or after the racquet swing but, by summer's end, their timing improved significantly.

The Yeomen were rich with tennis players this year. While some worked on refining their strokes and timing, others were able to work on many of the finer points of tennis. An effort was made to get the Yeomen to concentrate on hitting smooth, penetrating shots rather than entertaining themselves with different spins and looping shots.

The Lancers were also packed with many fine players. Progress was made with forcing matches by coming to net to volley. Progress was also made in learning how to combat net-rushers. Serving was stressed in the Lancer group as many were hampered by extremely weak second serves. The progress they made in serving was laudable.

With the Friars we concentrated on "court sense" and balanced movement. Many had the tools for good play but these tools broke down when they were forced to move for shots. By teaching them balance and economical footwork, we enabled them to use their strokes much more effectively by summer's end.

The Foresters as a group made the most progress this summer. Volleying was stressed in the Forester group. They all had the strokes to be aggressive players but lacked the volleys to finish the points off. Intensive work around the net was the hallmark of the Forester summer and I'd like to thank them for their efforts.

Remember when: Sol and Jason paying the price for too big of a swing on their volleys...Kevin, are you ready to run?...running what?...more drilling? Do we have to?... Everyone keeps getting better as the years go by. Try to be better than you think you are. Bama Pies and Myrtle.

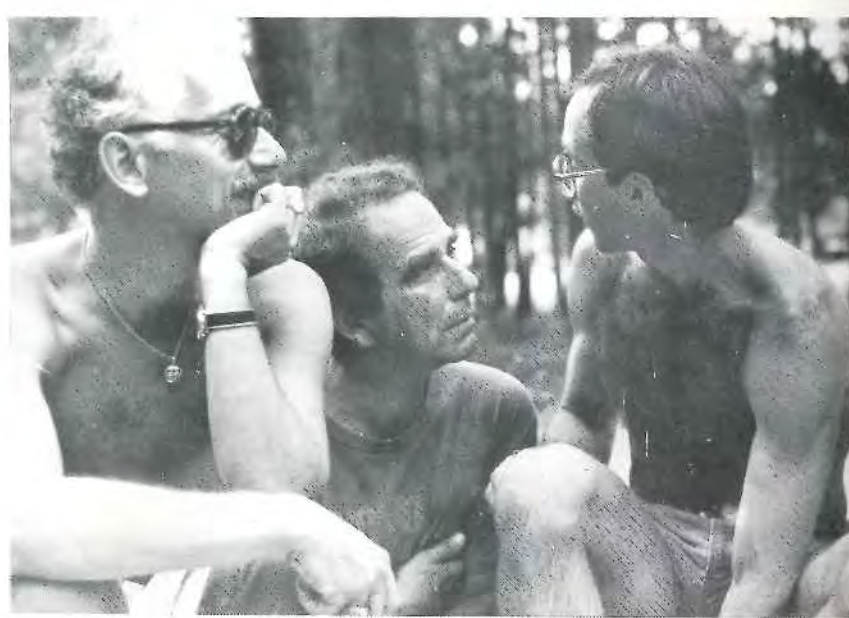
