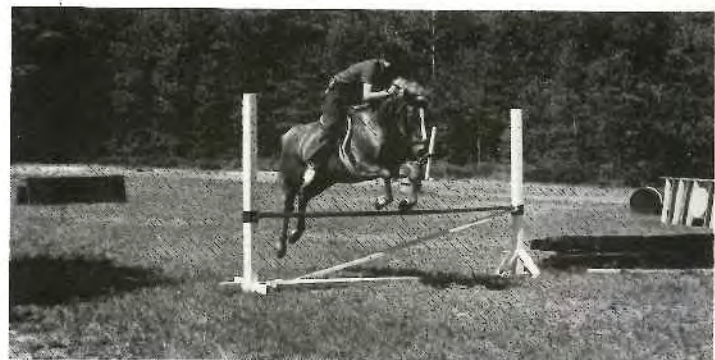
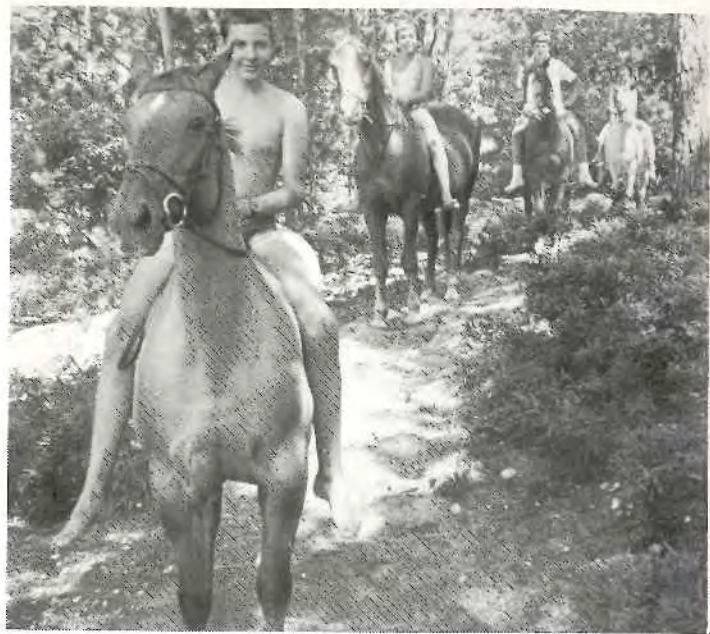
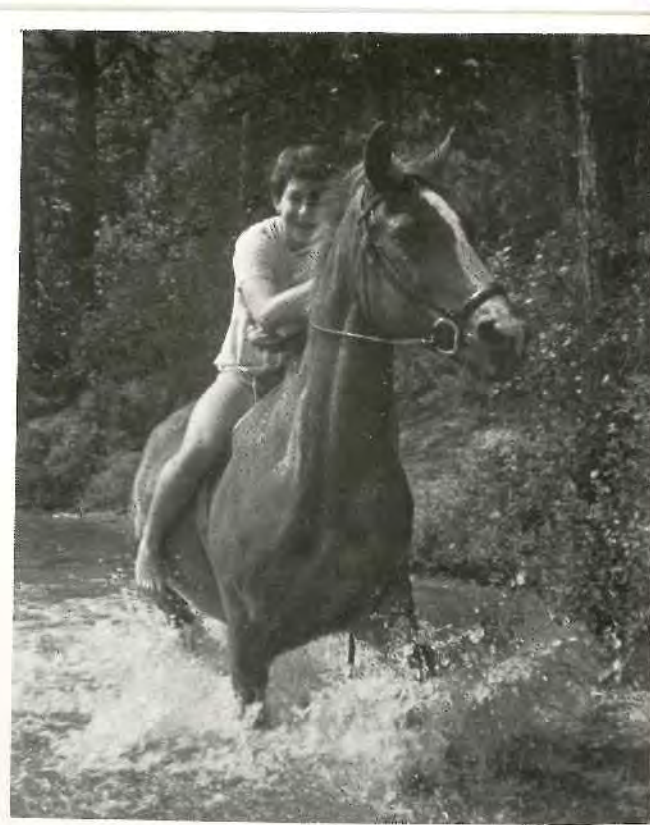
Now that the summer is over and everyone has left camp, it is very quiet around the barn. Many memories come to mind. Remember.....

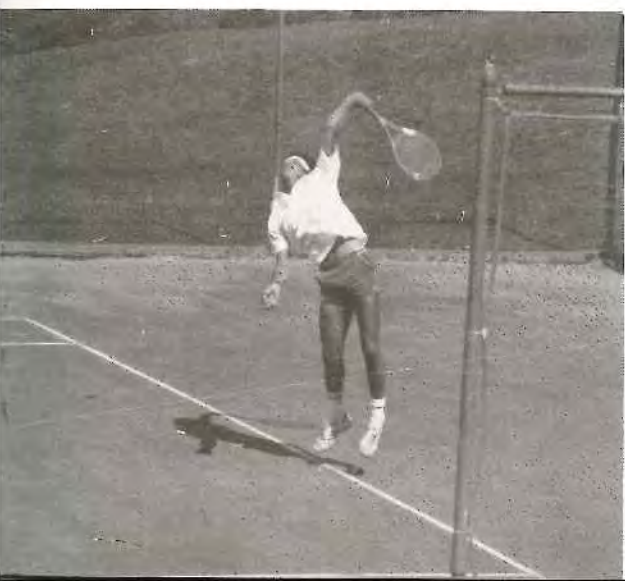
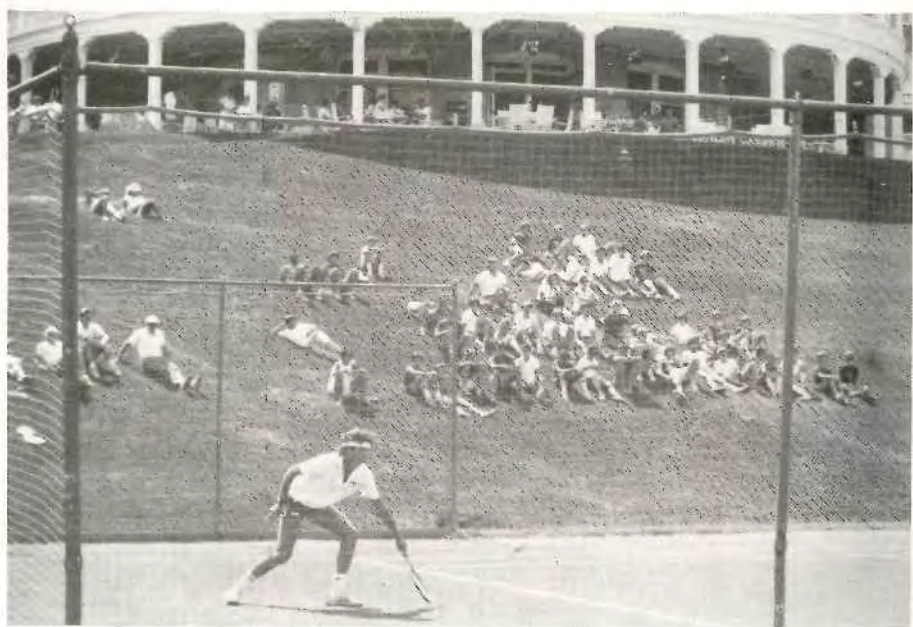

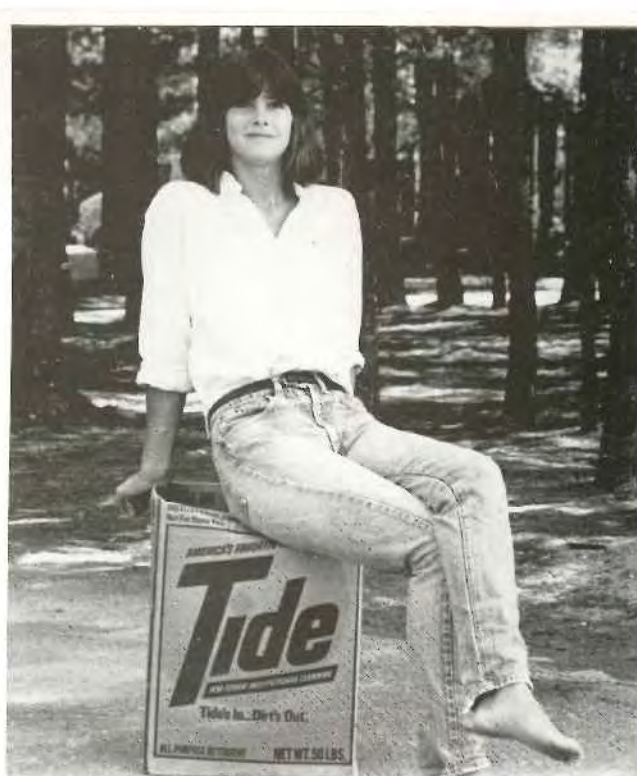
Last of all there was David Steinberg, who earned his best in camp award for his long distance bare-footing; And of course, for his superb slalom skiing.

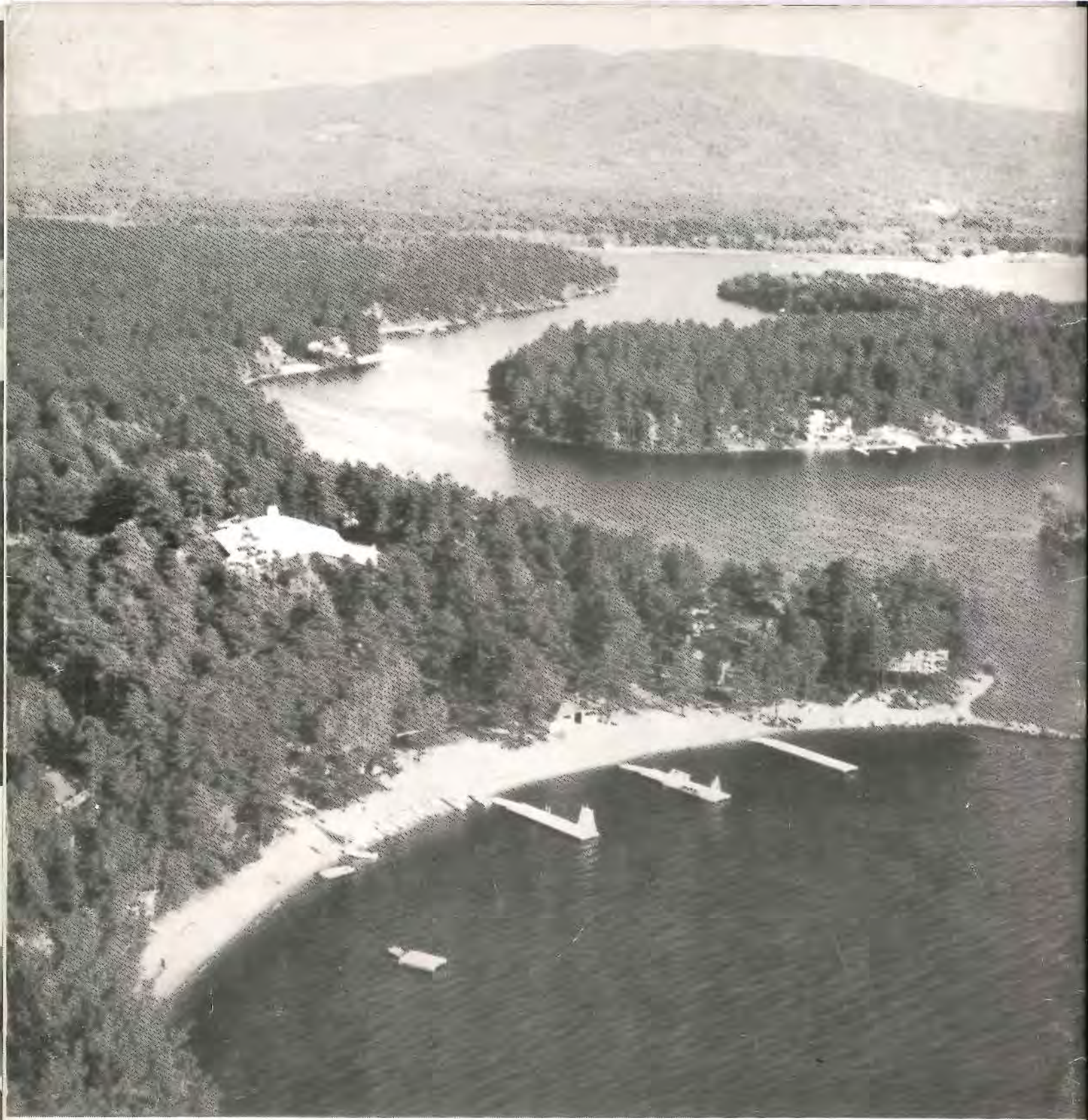
