# ARCHERY

I arrived at camp for this, my first year at Robin Hood, expecting no more than a few stick bows, perhaps the odd run-down target and a part-time soccer pitch for a range. Instead, I was shown 20 Olympic-style recurve bows (now 24), 12 targets (now 16), a 90 m range that would put most tournament ranges to shame, and a new archery shack as a recent addition. I was shown records and scores from 1989 (many were of an astonishingly high standard) and we pledged to make 1990 an even greater success.

The equipment was moved, the lines were painted, the targets set up, the bows repaired...and all personally, my partner conveniently arriving after pre-camp orientation ("I built this range..well..in the same way Christopher Wren built St. Paul's Cathedral")

This year's archery intensive took place early in the season and proved to be the first great success. The course included intensive individual coaching (including use of video), relaxation and concentration techniques and Michel George's 'flexibility for archery' programme.

All passed...Josh Aronoff and Sam Chaouki, Danielle Sarao passed with credits, and Seth Demsey, Josh Neidorf, Michael Soltoff, Dan Borsody, Rick Bailey, Jon Feigenbaum all received distinction.

Robin Hood's debut tournament and, in fact, the first Tri-State in which the camp competed was held this year at Lanakila. The competition was the climax of 3 years work and training. Special thanks must go to the 10, 12 and unders who so "willingly", faced with threats and bribery, were dragged out of bed half an hour early. First to shoot was the 10 and under division. The collective score of 810 was a great performance by a young side. (Lanakila 651, Moosilauke 540, and Winaukee (504). Shawn Clyman, who (he assures us) has plagued oppositions all summer took individual gold and Ari Kandel, Michael Sacerdote, Josh Bailey, Josh Morgan and Danny Horowitz all contributed to the victory. In the 12 and under division Dan Borsody (228) took overall first place with Aaron Schildkrout (227) a close second. Toby Stern (218), Rick Bailey (214), Theo Gangi (202), and Ben Brody (198) all contributed to our team score of 1275 to finish once again in first place, ahead of Lanakila (1075), Winaukee (763) and Moosilauke (632). Yet all 6 of those Archers were capable of great performances and proved this time and time again. Robin Hood had taken 2 of 2, with only the 15's left to shoot. The shooting distance was increased to 25m. Glenn Plosa (260), who hadn't shot before the competition day that season, proved his point ("my heart bleeds for people like you!"). He took individual gold ahead of Stefan Friedman (239), David Sacerdote, Michael Soltoff and Jack Weiner. The team score of 1226 was enough to overcome the opposition - Lanakila (1195) Aloha (777) and Moosilauke, 3 victories for 3, a clean sweep...I couldn't have asked for more.

Soon after we were yet again to face Winaukee. Our 10's, 11's and 12's, both in the home and away matches were successful. Thank you to all those who helped with the organization and scoring - counselors and campers alike.

In our own tournament, in the 11 and under division, competition between Robin Hood and more notably Indian Acres was intense. Shawn Clyman was pushed into 2nd place with a total of 254, Toby Stern (219) took overall 3rd and Brandon Barnett (203) came in 6th. All won ribbons. Josh Bailey, using a bow twice his own size rose to the occasion and overwhelmed his opponent with a personal best of 200. Matt Bronson and Richard Gordon also contributed to a total of 1040 to finish ahead of Indian Acres (1006), Winaukee (437) and Forest Acres (362). One out of one.



Despite the loss of several team members after 4 weeks, our 13 and under division was able to dominate the competition. Sandi Plosa (242), our only girl competitor, took individual 2nd place, Rick Bailey (242) took 3rd, Sam Chaouki (239) 4th, and Seth Demsey (228), 5th place. Dan Borsody (223) and David Greenbaum (219) narrowly missed the ribbons. The team score of 1174 was more than enough to clinch victory over Pemi (1026), Indian Acres (1005), Lanakila (963) and Forest Acres (411), 2 of 2.

The 15 and under division attracted the largest number of competing teams. Robin Hood was encouraged by Glenn Plosa's score of 274 and Dale Murphy's 252, (only the second time Dale shot this year). Stefan Friedman (269, 5th), Josh Guttman (243), Michael Soltoff (207) and Brian Agin (176) all contributed to an excellent challenge of a seemingly invincible Indian Acres team. Robin Hood (1245) then was narrowly edged into second place by Indian Acres (a team that included the regional champion). Lanakila (1210), Pemi (1185), Forest Acres (1147) and Waukeela (746) were 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th respectively.

Robin Hood, with an overall total of 3459 had seized both the camp record and the meet record - 3 out of 4 trophies. Congratulations to all competitors - I knew you could do it.

The most abiding memory of Green and White archery was the rain. The scores were read out from the target by "brave souls" who ventured into the rain and recorded by Mark sitting in the archery shack! (Steve Cooney, 1990). The closest competition was the Fo/Sax. Stefan Friedman ("this one's for you, Ralby"), Glenn Plosa and Corky Stern (White) finished only 16 ahead of the Green. Josh Ralby (245) - who finally decided to shoot with sights, Kenny LaFreniere and Dale Murphy provided the closest of finishes. Recognition must go to Phil Becker who, from 15m shot a 211 without sights.

The archery awards were, once again hotly contested. The BIC Junior Camp award went to Shawn Clyman for some consistent and often astonishing scores. Toby Stern was adjudged to be "Most Improved". In Senior Camp, the BIC award was given jointly to Stefan Friedman and Glenn Plosa - the competition between them was intense throughout. Thank you, Stefan, for all your help. The most improved I decided finally to award to Dan Borsody who adapted to sights so well, put a lot of effort into the sport and shot so consistently well in each competition. An honourable mention must go to Rick Bailey who haunted the range and showed great potential. By the end of the 8 weeks he was shooting consistent 250's and both, I'm sure, will be an invaluable asset to the programme in years to come. Well done, both of you; the decision was tough! Congratulations to all winners.

Remember when...Steve Cooney took 3 wrong directions on the same road on the way to Lanakila...Mark navigating...agreeing to go to Pizza Barn if we got a clean sweep...Jack Weiner and Stefan Friedman directing Steve Cooney into the drive of Camp Huckins...the Green team's sabotaged bows during Green and White?...Amy Ginsberg's use of the arrow!?...Brian Agin's enthusiasm...and countless more, but I've only got a few minutes more to write this article.

We can look back on this summer with pride and look ahead to next year. At every age level there were exceptionally talented archers and enormous potential. With further work on our part and as much effort on yours we can harness and nurture this potential. Archery at Robin Hood was all I'd hoped and expected it would be. Steve Cooney - you were a brick!!

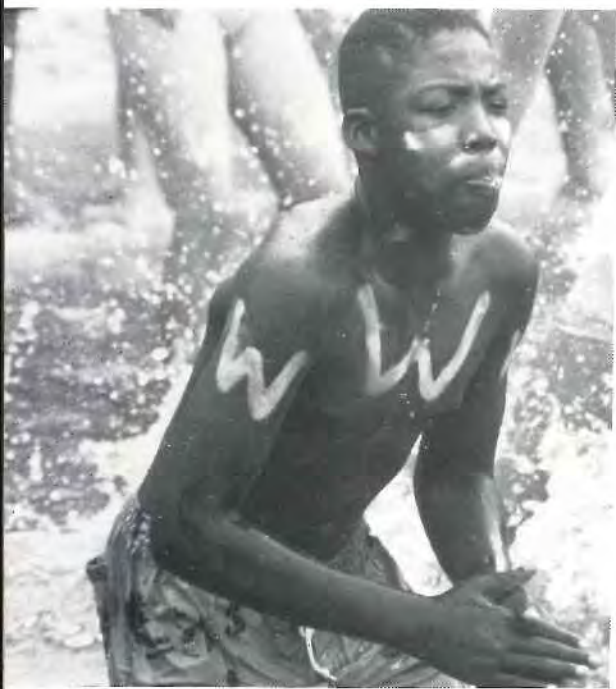

Ken LaFreniere added 16 points. Glenn Plosa, Josh Ralby and Brian Agin each scored 11 points and pulled down 12,9 and 10 rebounds, respectively.



RH jumped out to a 13-4 lead at the end of the first period in the Birchmont game. The lead increased to 25-13 at the half. The winning momentum carried on into the third quarter and the gap increased to 45-19. Brian Agin led the Hooders in a fourth period assault on Birchmont with four field goals and 5 rebounds. Jon Leebow rang up six points and Todd Dery pleased the crowd with a three pointer and a two. Friedman led the scoring overall with 16 and Plosa pulled down 8 rebounds to lead in that category.

Indian Acres ambushed the Hooders in the first period of the semi-final game 19-5 and this deficit was too great to overcome. RH did make a good run in the second quarter behind the scoring of Friedman (7 pts) and LaFreniere (4 pts) and the lead was reduced to 4 (17-21). The game remained close throughout the third period and ended with RH trailing by 6, 25-31. The final score of 34-48 was not indicative of the closeness of the contest. In desperation attempts to force turnovers the Hooders fouled frequently and Indian Acres seemed to live on the foul line, making 7 of 13 free throws to put the game out of reach. Robin Hood entered the Tri-States with a very tired group of players. On the previous Tuesday they played four games in the Samoset Tournament, losing a close game in the finals. Wednesday they played an inter-camp soccer game. Wednesday night they went to Fenway Park in Boston to see the Red Sox play a night game and got back to camp about 3 a.m. The team had to leave for the Tri-States right after breakfast Thursday morning to be ready for a 10 o'clock tap off. In spite of this unique conditioning program Robin Hood placed third in the twelve-team field of the 1990 15 & under Tri-States Basketball Tournament!!

Two divisions were created for morning games and the six teams in each division played three 20-minute games against each other to determine seedings for the afternoon championship competition. Although RH only won one of its morning contests they clearly played in the stronger division and the quarter-final game against Winaukee Silver was no contest for the more talented Hooders who won easily 38-12. Glenn Plosa led the scoring in this game with 12 points. Kenny LaFreniere and Josh Ralby added 8 and 6 points respectively. The tired Hooders were no match for the Winaukee Gold team in the semi finals and were trounced 19-39. LaFreniere led the scoring with 5 points. In their sixth game of the day (10th in three days) RH summoned up enough energy to defeat Moosilauke 37-22 in the consolation final to take third place. Stefan Friedman came alive in the game to lead RH with 16 points. Dave Perlmutter tossed in 9 points and Josh Ralby played a fine floor game and gathered in 9 rebounds. This victory avenged an upset defeat the Hooders experienced in a morning game earlier in the day at the hands of Moosilauke.

#### SOCCER

It was the partnership of myself (Tom Metcalf) and Hugh Payne that looked forward to the beginning of the soccer season the most. This year was the first year for a while that two soccer staff were employed at "The Realm" so right from the start we both had big plans for the 8 weeks of camp. Having spent the week before camp started preparing the three soccer fields, the boys and girls began their lessons with newly painted fields and goal posts, new balls and nets and us two ready for anything they could throw at us.

The season got off to a very quick start as the specialty week that was enjoyed so much the years before, started after only a few days of camp. This year's turn out was the biggest yet, 38 children from Senior camp enrolled for four days of intensive training in such matters as heading, tackling, shooting, passing and space awareness. By the amount of people mentioned above you can see that picking a team to represent this age group wasn't the easiest of jobs. In the end players had to be switched around. This switching seemed to work as the Winaukee Tri-State tournament brought out the best in our boys as we reached the semi-final and were just unlucky not to make the final itself.

# THE MEDIA

## NEWSPAPER

The 1990 season was a busy one for the camp newspaper. Participation was at a very high level, with writers, artists, humorists and editors from both junior and senior camp. Twelve issues were published, followed by a special mystery story booklet.

The first issue included the bylines of General Editor Adam Marc Leonard, Junior Camp Editor Eric Jacobstein and newcomer Andrew Gralnek of Squires. By the second issue, it had become clear that the creative output of Robin Hood campers was going to require a two-page paper on a regular basis. Issue two featured photogram art by Michael Holczer and Jon Feigenbaum, artistically arranged by Jacob A.C. Remes. Friar Alex (Babalou) Marx wrote a highly professional recap of the first 15 & under basketball game with West End. Squire Josh Edmundson, newly named a reporter, summarized the campers' states of origin.

The two-page issues began with the third, and it was a hum-dinger! A ghost had allegedly been sighted near the Old Rifle Range and Lancer David Sacerdote provided a picture to prove it. The picture was put on display at the TNT office and many campers came by to check it out. Most of the writers and artists did the headlining and layouts for their own work.

In Issue 6, David Sacerdote admitted that his "Ghost Picture" was a clever hoax, but the Camp Robin remained swathed in mystery. Jacob Remes wrote the plaudits and Lancer Sami Chaouki made the biggest RH word search ever seen. Amy Rabin wrote about the Field Day.

The summer of 1990 again developed into another enthusiastic season for all levels of riflery at Sherwood Forest Rifle Range. By the end of the season 38000 rounds had been fired and 207 shooters had come out to the range to shoot. Over 7000 targets were submitted for scoring and 78 boys and 13 girls had earned their shooting awards - from Pro-Marksman (PM) through Expert. Among these 91 shooters, 222 levels of awards were earned.

**Twenty one Squires** came to riflery and learned many new shooting skills. Twelve earned 35 different levels of awards, with the most improved learners being Robert Squires earning PM through Bar 1 and Scott Burk earning MM through Bar 2 (sitting). The high shooter of the group was Robert Squires with 48 out of 50. **Thirty one Archers** came to riflery as many times as were available. Nineteen earned 70 different levels of awards. The most improved learners were Sebastian Marx's earning PM through Bar 4 (sitting) and Shawn Clyman earning Bar 4 through Bar 9 (standing). The high shooter of the group was Clyman with 49 in (prone), 48 in (sitting), 47 in (kneeling) and 41 in (standing). **Twenty eight Yeomen** appeared at riflery. Eighteen earned 35 different levels of awards. The most improved shooters were Albert Cohen earning Bar 5 through Bar 7 (kneeling) and Bryan Smith earning PM through Bar 2 (sitting). The high shooter of the group was Albert Cohen with 49 out of 50. **Thirty four Lancers** shot riflery with seventeen earning 36 different levels of awards. The two most improved were Michael Weinberg earning Bar 5 through Bar 7 (kneeling) following with Bar 8 in (standing). Mike Deatly earned Bar 4 (sitting), Bar 5 through Bar 7 (kneeling) and Bar 8 in (standing). The high shooter was Weinberg with a perfect 50 out of 50. **Fourteen Friars** came to riflery when time allowed with six individuals earning 9 different levels of awards. The most improved shooters were Michael Soltoff earning Bar 1 (prone) and Bar 2 (sitting); Matt Cohen earning Bar 7 (kneeling); and Marc Oliver earning an Expert rating. The high shooter of the group was again Marc Oliver, averaging 96.25 on all his match competitions. Oliver finished with a 98 out of 100 at the range. Of the **nineteen Foresters**, when time allowed, a select number came out for recreational shooting with a few working on harder and more advanced skills; six of these earned 16 different levels of awards. The most improved shooters were Lionel Andre earning PM through Bar 1 (prone); David Gershenson earning Bar 6 and 7 (kneeling), Bar 8 and 9 in (standing) and Marksman 1 in (standing) for the J.O.S.P. The most improved was Jeff Josephson earning his third Expert rating in the Light Rifle Course (prone). The high shooter of the group was again J.J. with a perfect score of 50 out of 50. Then the **Saxons**: these eight young men, when time permitted them to shoot, came out to enjoy some free time entertainment.

The younger girls of Robin Hood also developed a keen interest in learning to shoot. For the **Jesters**, ten young ladies came to learn a new and rewarding sport, with two having the most desire to earn awards. Lauren Soloway earned PM and MM in (prone) with Amy Whiting earning MM and MMLst in (prone). The best and most improved was again Amy. **Eighteen Bows** came to riflery to learn many new skills with a lot of fun. Seven of these girls earned 12 different levels of awards. Lisa Haralambie earned SS and Bar 1 (prone) and Molly Meltzer earned MM through Bar 1 (prone). The high shooter was Molly Meltzer. **Thirteen Arrows**

came with three earning new awards. Dawn Bubnis earned PM, Sari Nadler earned MMLst and Sandi Plosa earned MM and MMLst, all being in (prone). **Ten Shires** took the opportunity to come out and shoot to earn new awards. 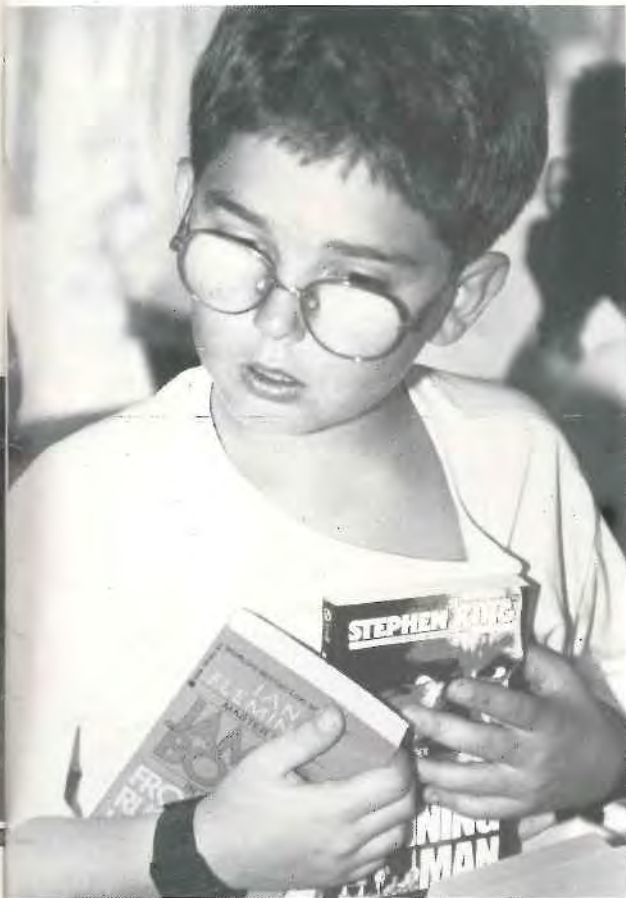
