A Jester's Mini-page included artful contributions by Margarita Romero, Julie Ritz, Anne Loughlin and Carly Neidorf and writings by Britt Barquist, Cora Crowley, Kim Frumkin and Mara Weinstein. As usual, the parent's Edition was distributed from the Red Wagon, which was artfully decorated by the TNT staff.

PHOTOGRAPHY

What a fine group of budding photographers we have at Camp Robin Hood! In my six years here, I have been very pleased to see the photography participation almost double from 68 in 1988 to 133 in 1993. Handling this larger number of campers with limited space and equipment was made possible by the fine assistance of photo counselor Eileen Pupa. We have all learned more about picture-taking and print-making, but most of all, we have had fun doing it. The best ideas have come from the campers themselves. Our experiments have taken us from pinhole cameras to horizontal enlargers and from giant mosquito-grams to ghost pictures of Robin Hood Past.

Once again, the Jesters lead the way since they were the only group to have 100% participation. This young group was always enthusiastic and eager to try new things. The hardest part of darkroom techniques is loading exposed film into a light-tight processing tank in total darkness. The following seven Jesters accomplished this feat: Britt Barquist, Cora Crowley, Kim Frumkin, Anne Loughlin, Carly Neidorf, Margarita Romero and Mara Weinstein. Because of their young age, most required some counselor help while in the dark. However, Cora Crowley was able to load the film all by herself and she did it at least three times. Because of her active participation and fine progress in darkroom techniques, she received an Honorable Mention in Photography.

The Bows seemed to enjoy darkroom projects more than picture-taking activities. They printed some camp negatives for themselves and their parents and they also made many photograms. The most popular photograms were made with a small penlight. Photography means "writing with light" and that is what Jessica Freidin, Kari Kirschenbaum, and Maya Willner did a lot of. The only Bow who loaded and processed her own film was Rebecca Strauss. The Arrows came to photography just once. They borrowed cameras and film and each person took a roll of pictures. However, they never came back to process and print their photographs. Since B&W film keeps very well, I have saved the exposed rolls of film. Therefore, I strongly recommend that all the Arrows come back to Camp Robin Hood next year and then they will be able to process and print all their great pictures.

The Shires and Scribes were the most active participants in photography. They attended often and in large numbers. They not only did a lot of picture-taking but also took good advantage of the darkroom facilities. The following campers loaded film in the dark and processed their own negatives: Tiffany Barber, Amy Eisenberg, Johanna Fierman, Jamie Koss, Jaime Lucove, Jill Markowitz, Lisa Rudikoff and Scribe Abby Fierman. It takes a lot of patience, practice and persistence to improve and excel in any activity. Photography is no exception. In the Girls Program, Shire Jill Markowitz exhibited "Best In Camp" photo skills and received the Photography Award for Effort and Skill. Scribe Abby Fierman showed the most improvement and received the Photography Award for Progress and Achievement.

The Juggler/Squires enjoyed taking pictures of the chipmunks which they trapped and the fish which they caught. Also, they liked making photograms of toads and bugs. The five most active darkroom workers were Lars Barquist, David Goldberg, Matt Rosenfeld, Michael Squires and Michael Thalhimier. They all loaded film in the dark and processed it by following proper develop-stop-fix-wash procedures. Michael Squires demonstrated great patience and determination by returning to the darkroom many times throughout the summer to make at least one 5x7 enlargement of each negative on his 24-exposure roll. For his efforts, Michael was recognized with an Honorable Mention in Photography.

Issue 11 had a story about the upcoming production of "Phantom Of The Opera" and a truly unique account of the Forester/Shire Mt. Katahdin expedition by Eric Jelin. Margarita Romero wrote about her native Mexico, and Seth Lieberman told about Day 1 of his excursion. A picture by Britt Barquist and a fine poem by Eve Klein rounded out the issue.

Adam Rothschild, who also contributed a lot to the parents' Edition, made a splendid three-page special edition featuring the Green and White photography winners. The twelfth edition featured more of the beautiful poems from the Green and White Competition and also two of the illustrations from camp songs. In addition, they have enjoyed printing memorable moments from mountain hikes, overnight campouts and Ogunquit Beach trips. The following senior boys exhibited fine photographic skills: Yeomen Scott Gordon, Jordan Klein, Adam Rothschild and Josh Weiner; Lancer Jeff Hess; Friars Shawn Clyman, Danny Kramer and Marcus Magarian; Foresters Matt Bronson, Jon Feigenbaum, Josh Neidorf, Damien Paumi and Aaron Price; and Saxons Adam Leonard, Michael Rosen and Michael Weinberg.

All summer long Yeoman Adam Rothschild and Saxon Adam Leonard competed head-to-head regarding who could learn more about photography and master more advanced darkroom techniques. It was very appropriate that each would lead their respective teams in the Green and White Photography Contest. Rothschild's White Team won the contest 15 to 10. However, the overall photo skill and knowledge of these two fine young photographers was too close to call. Therefore, it was with great pleasure that I recommended, and John Klein agreed, that Adam Marc Leonard and Adam Stephen Rothschild would share the Photography Award for Effort and Skill (Best In Camp). I wish to convey my sincere congratulations to all the Award winners, the Honorable Mentions and all the campers who participated in Photography 1993.

RIDING

The Robin Hood stables are silent for the first time in two months; the tack room has been emptied. I have seen the horses depart closely followed by the campers and the riding staff. The 1993 riding program is over.

I'm sitting at the tack room table reading words that I have written during my first summer at Robin Hood - my journal, riding group lists, results of the Robin Hood Horse Show, list of indications (horses and riding staff), lists of riding attendance and my diary of lessons detailing who did what, on what horse, and how well they did it. All of this information would be very uninteresting to anyone else! But for me, they help conjure up memories of the hot and stormy summer (weather, that is!) that I spent at Robin Hood. My memories are obviously from a different perspective than yours but some of them will hopefully trigger your own personal memories of life at the Robin Hood stables.

Where were the horses? Where was the hay? These were the two most frequently repeated questions asked by the riding staff of 1993 during staff orientation. John told us the horses would be arriving from Boston soon. Tom Adams told us the rain was delaying the baling of the hay. We trusted them and sure enough, two of the most important assets of a riding program arrived - and in the correct order, hay first and horses second. Tina, Dawn, Diane and myself rode the ten animals that we would grow to know so well: Blue Eyes, Nelson, Sprite, Max, Scat, Spectrum, Tony, Leigh, Splash, and Hutch. We analyzed them, praised them and criticized them. Then the campers arrived and we repeated the process!

The campers were split, within their groups, into sub-groups that would best aid the improvement of individual riding abilities. Our three main areas as instructors were:

- 1) to stimulate and guide every camper so that they fulfilled their own personal riding goals;
- 2) to create an environment where the campers had fun; and,
- 3) to always keep safety firmly in mind.

These aims often conflicted but conflict was kept to a minimum.

We lost and gained horses throughout the season. Blue Eyes picked arguments with everyone - fellow Equines as well as the riding staff and campers. Nelson said his back hurt and he felt a little unsteady on his legs. Hutch decided he was only a four-week camper. We said our farewells to the above - some fonder than others. The replacements arrived, introduced themselves, analyzed the riding staff and said they'd stay 'til the end of camp. So we welcomed Sam Fred, William Buster and Chuck into the fold and never once asked why two of them had two names each or what Chuck's last name was.

We had seventy riders in the program. Thirty of these were either first-time or virtual beginner riders. My most rewarding moments were seeing campers making that first tentative upward step toward a higher level of horsemanship: Danny Horowitz riding for the first time, perfecting the correct riding position within the first lesson and doing a balanced riding trot by the fourth week; Cathy Newman and Hilary Spitz doing their first canters off-the-lead;

Eric Carrion rising trot so proficiently on Chuck during the Robin Hood Horse Show in the last week of camp; Fallyn Smith riding perfectly balanced canter circuits during her final lesson; Veronica Erard riding a course of show jumps with a subtle difference - she didn't use a saddle! She showed that you can still be in the correct jumping position and can balance your horse even if you are riding bareback; Jaime Lucove gaining the confidence to jump a round of showjumps; Sarah Mendelsohn and Johanna Fierman both steadily gaining their confidence over jumps under the careful tutorage of Diane until they were jumping a 2'6" course accurately and with style; all of the Jesters (Britt, Margarita, Carly and Cora) becoming more and more confident in their riding abilities during every lesson; Michael Squires showing how his "horse control" had improved when he competed so successfully in the Robin Hood Horse Show gymkhana events.

I haven't mentioned everyone, it would be impossible to do that, but everyone showed improvement to some degree and I hope everyone got pleasure from their riding this summer. I suppose I ought to mention the winners of the "Tumbler Competition", that is the best fall of camp! Ironically, the two leading members of the "Tumbler Club" were two of Robin Hood's most accomplished riders; Jay Shroyer and leading "Pantry girl" Susie Whalley. I watched in horror as Jay Shroyer lost contact with Nelson's saddle twice on the same corner. Each time he made a long and very graceful flight through the air, the second longer than the first, and each time he landed in the "starfish belly-down" position and came up smiling. I watched with equal horror as Susie jumped a fence (perfectly I might add) and then turned right while Scat turned left; this happened twice! (I hoped I haven't offended either of you but at least you got a mention in this yearbook!)

As I conclude this article, I am in the bus traveling towards Boston and the start of my six week North American adventure. I wonder if my memories of Robin Hood are already blurred and unsharpened by an early onslaught of nostalgia. Maybe they are but what's wrong with that?

Now for the "thank you's". I would like to thank the infirmary for keeping both riding staff and horses fighting fit throughout the summer. Thank you to Tina and Dawn for attempting to cope with my humor. A special thank you to Diane for always giving me 200% effort in trying to produce a riding program where every camper left with a sense of achievement, however small. Thank you to the Lancers: Danny, Eric and Andrew for keeping me up-to-date with all of the camp gossip (however uninterested I tried to appear at the time).



Good luck to you all in your riding; if I achieved anything this summer, I hope it was to show you that the learning of new riding skills can be fun and that the greater your level of horsemanship the more fun you will have. Most of you I'll never meet again, but all of you gave me a memorable summer. Thank you and I hope you continue to get pleasure from that remarkable animal - the horse!

RIFLERY

The summer of 1993 produced a very high quality of fine shooters at the Sherwood Forest Rifle Range. By the end of the season, 42,500 rounds had been fired and a large section of the camp came out to the range to shoot. Over 7,000 targets were submitted for scoring and 81 boys and 23 girls had earned shooting awards from Pro-Marksman (PM) through Expert 2. Among those, 260 levels of awards were earned.

Of 24 PJ/Squires, all came to riflery to learn new shooting skills and some to improve on past abilities, where 17 earned 34 different levels of awards. The most improved in the group was Matt Rosenfeld, earning Bar 4 (sitting). The high shooter of the group was Michael Squires shooting a high score of 88. 24 Archers also came to riflery to expand on riflery skills already learned, with 13 earning 36 different levels of awards. The most improved learner was Nick Munkenbeck earning Bar 3 (sitting) through Bar 8 (standing) combined with earning the Most Improved in Junior Camp. The high shooter of the group was Eduardo Capriles with a 92, also combined with earning the Best in Junior Camp award. 23 Yeomen came to riflery to learn new, and improve on old, shooting abilities with 16 earning 48 different levels of awards. The most improved and the best shooter was Jarett Kaplus earning MM1st (prone) through Bar 8 (standing) and shooting a high score of 99. Jarett was also one of three individuals to earn the Most Improved in Senior Camp award. 26 Lancers also came to riflery to expand on those skills already learned, with 11 earning 28 different levels of awards. The two most improved were Josh Bailey and Andrew Leonard both earning Bar 5 & 6 (kneeling). The high shooter of the group was Jeff Squires shooting a 97. Following, 23 Friars came to riflery to expand and improve on the higher levels of Marksmanship with 11 earning 51 levels of awards. The two most improved learners in the group were JJ Ackell earning 6 Experts and Josh Slater earning an Expert level. Both boys were also awarded the Most Improved in Senior Camp. The high shooters of the Friars were three boys obtaining perfect scores of 50 and 100, these being JJ Ackell, Shawn Clyman and Marcus Magarian. Finalizing the Friars high levels of shooting skills, JJ Ackell and Shawn Clyman were also awarded the Best in Senior Camp. Of 16 Foresters, several boys came out to the range for fun and to improve on old skills, with 8 earning 20 levels of awards. The two with the most

patience were Jon Feigenbaum earning Bar 1. (prone) through Bar 6 (kneeling) and Damien Paumi earning MM (prone) through Bar 5 (kneeling). The top shooter was Albert Cohen shooting a 95. The 12 Saxons came to shoot when time was available to have fun. Adam Leonard obtained Bar 4 (sitting) followed by Michael Weinberg being the high shooter with a 97.

8 Jesters came to riflery and all learned new shooting skills with a lot of fun with 3 earning 3 awards: Julie Ritz, Margarita Romero and Maya Weinstein (PM). 21 Bows then came to riflery to expand and improve on higher levels of marksmanship with 10 earning 18 different levels of awards. Jessica Freidin obtained Bar 2 & 3 (sitting). Jessica with her patience, achievements and desire to improve was awarded the Most Improved in Girls Camp. The high shooter of the group was Carolyn Lewenberg shooting a 155. Of 6 Arrows who came to riflery, many times enjoying shooting while learning new skills, 5 earned 8 different awards.
